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SECTION 1 COUNCIL CAMPS

CAMP PARSONS - GATEWAY TO THE OLYMPICS

Camp Parsons is a salt, seaside camping area located on Hood Canal at the foot of the Olympic Mountains. Facilities include archery range, row boats, canoes, fishing equipment, rope yard, axe yard, demonstration areas, and nature trails. Instruction is given in beginning and advanced swimming, lifesaving and all outdoor merit badges. Cook outs, camp fires, stunt nites, hikes and church services are among the many varied activities that keep the Scouts busy and happy. The camp is well staffed throughout the summer season. For information as to fees and added information contact the Scout office at PA 5-5200. This camp is also available during the off-season for individual units on weekends. Call Scout office for information.

T-H RANCH - ADVENTURES FOR EXPLORERS

This camp is designed for those Scouts that are looking for real "rocking" western adventure. What is the T-H Ranch? Well, first it's a full fledged ranch with horses, burros, cattle and other farm animals. It has barns, tractors, farm machinery and all the rest that make up a real operating ranch.

Second, it is a base camp for some of the finest hiking you'll ever find. Over 100 miles of trails lead out from the ranch into Alpine country, warm lakes for swimming, cold ones for fishing, ghost towns, old mines, great scenery, rugged climbing and plenty more.

Third, it's a conservation and nature camp. Those interested can get know-how and practice in erosion control, stream management, fishing and game bird habitat improvement, forest management and all phases of soil conservation.

Finally, it's a summer camp with all its activity designed especially for teen-agers!

A two week stay is suggested. . . . one at the Ranch enjoying the many activities provided there and the other week take a hiking trip into the Scenic Alpine country of the Central Cascade Mountains.

The summer season is between the months of June through August. On weekends of the non-summer season reservations for use of horses, hayrides, and other ranch facilities can be procured by contacting the Scout Office.

CAMP OMACHE - GATEWAY TO THE CENTRAL CASCADES

Towering firs and cedars, a warm lake nestled in the foothills of the Cascades, miles of forest trails----this is Camp Omache. To this ideal setting, add rifle and archery ranges, swimming, beaches for beginning and advanced swimmers, boats, canoes, axe yards, rope yards, nature trails and much more and you have the perfect place to have fun and improve Scouting skills.

Camp Omache is a wilderness camp. All the cooking is done by the Scouts on a Troop basis. Troops must provide their own cooking equipment and tents.

Camp Omache summer season is from June through August. The facilities at this camp are available for individual scout units by permission from the Scout Office during off-season periods.

North end troops get to Omache by going North to Snohomish, take Stevens Pass Highway to Monroe junction then turn left between Shell and Union Oil

Service Stations. Go approximately 9.6 miles on Lake Roesiger Road. Turn right into Camp Omache by following signs to the parking lot.

South end Districts

Cross Lake Washington Floating Bridge at Sunset Drive In Theater. Take State Highway 1A and proceed to Woodenville thence follow same route as north end districts.

Highline, White River, Renton areas. Take Highway 1A from Renton and proceed to Woodenville thence follow same route as for North Districts.

CAMP BACKUS

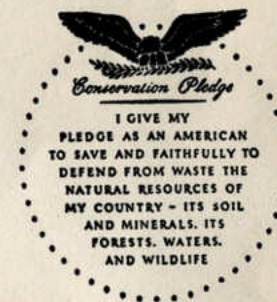
Across Floating Bridge, South four miles along West Mercer Way. Then two miles beyond Southeast 58th Street marker. Four large trees at left of road are trail markers. Spring water.

CAMP FREEMAN

Four miles east of Renton. Take Maple Valley road and one mile beyond railroad underpass, turn north on Jones Road, cross bridge, turn right and follow river for scant mile. Spring water. For further information on Camp Freeman and Camp Backus call the Scout Office.

CAMP SHEPHERD

Twenty nine miles South of Enumclaw on Naches Pass Highway. A winter camp only. November through April. Facilities: Ten cabins, capable of holding 214 boys and leaders. Opportunities for sledding and skiing. The camp is located twelve miles from Cayuse Pass. For additional information call the Council Office - PA 5-5200



SECTION 2 CITY FACILITIES

Most facilities available within the city limits of Seattle are limited to day time picnic areas, to swim beaches and pools. However, there is one overnight facility available, CAMP WILLIAM G. LONG.

CAMP WILLIAM G. LONG

The only area that the Seattle Park Department has set aside for organized group camping. Camp Long is open to all Scout groups for day activities but only boy scouts and explorers for overnight outings. Facilities consist of cabins, running water, rest rooms, open fire areas, stoves and trench fire areas. The outdoor opportunities include Schurman Rock and the Glacier where groups may receive basic mountain climbing instruction by camp personnel; a nature and tracking trail, large stone compass, knot yard, Capture the Flag area, and parade area. The camp is 70 acres in size with three and one half miles of trails. It is not open to the public or for picnics--- only organized groups under adult leadership. Groups must make application by calling Camp Long, WEst 5-0370.

SECTION 3 FOREST SERVICE CAMPS

This section includes all Forest Service Maintained Campgrounds which can be used for "out of the car" type camping operations. Use of these facilities is based on a first come first served basis. However, in off-season periods these camps afford the best opportunity for working on basic scouting skills.

Included below are listings of the Regional Forest and District Headquarters which may be contacted for advice and assistance in any matters relative to use of forest areas, fire permits, etc. It is a good thing to remember that forest rangers are our best friends in the forest and go out of their way to assist in conservation and service projects. Anything Scouts and Scouters can do to cement good relations in the outdoor areas should be pursued with vigor.

CAMPS FOUND IN SNOQUALMIE NATIONAL FOREST

AMERICAN FORKS

Off U.S. 410, elevation 2,700 feet, twenty-two campsites, spring and piped water, sixteen fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. Just off Naches Highway, forty-nine miles northwest of Yakima at Junction of Bumping Lake Road. Community kitchen. Supplies at American River Resort one-fourth of a mile. Hunting, fishing and picnicking.

ASHAEL CURTIS

On U.S. 10, elevation 1,900 feet, five campsites, stream water, fifteen fireplaces, four toilets. On Sunset Highway twenty-three miles east of North Bend. Supplies at Summit Inn, four miles east. Fishing in river and mountain lakes.
On Skate Creek Road four miles southeast of Ashford at Nisqually Guard Station. Six fire holes. Camping and picnicking. Fishing nearby lakes.

BIG HILL

Off U.S. 410, elevation 2,450 feet, six campsites, stream water, three fireplaces, one toilet. On river road across from Naches Highway (US 410)

KEEP WASHINGTON GREEN

SNOQUALMIE NATIONAL FOREST CAMPS (Cont.)

forty miles northwest of Yakima. One mile from highway. Supplies highway stores one to three miles. Hunting fishing, picnicking,

BOULDER CAVE

Off U.S. 410, elevation 2,475, seven campsites, stream water, seven fireplaces, four toilets. On River Road three miles from across river from Naches Highway, U.S. 410, forty-four miles northwest of Yakima. Community kitchen. Supplies three miles. Hunting, fishing and picnicking.

BUMPING LAKE

Off U.S. 410, elevation 3,407, seven campsites, stream water, fourteen fireplaces, and four toilets. On Bumping lake road at the dam sixty miles northwest of Yakima. Supplies Goose prairie four miles. Fishing and boating.

CLEAR LAKE

Off state highway number five. Elevation 3,000 feet, seven toilets, twenty campsites, thirty fireplaces, and stream water. On Clear Lake, west of Rimrock Lake, two miles by forest road from White Pass Highway. Supplies Silver Beach Store, a distance of two miles. Fishing and boat landing.

CORRAL PASS

Off U.S. 410, elevation 5,690, four kyboes, eight campsites, eight fireplaces, and stream water. At end of Corral Pass forest road six miles from Naches Highway near Silver Springs Lodge. Thirty seven miles east of Enumclaw. Fishing at Lost and Echo Lakes.

COTTONWOOD

On U.S. 410, elevation 2300 feet, two toilets, eight campsites, five fireplaces, and stream water. On Naches Highway thirty-eight miles Northwest of Yakima. Supplies can be obtained one mile from camp.

COUGAR FLAT

Off U.S. 410, elevation 3,200 feet, two toilets, seven campsites, stream water. On Bumping Lake road fifty-four miles northwest of Yakima. Four fire holes.

DALLES

On U.S. 410, elevation 2,150 feet, forty-five campsites, forty-four fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities, and piped water. On Naches Highway twenty-five miles east of Enumclaw. Community kitchen, supplies Enumclaw, fishing, scenery, John Muir Grove.

DECEPTION CREEK

Off U.S. 2, elevation 1,900 feet, two campsites, three fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities, stream water. Off Stevens Pass Highway, ten miles east of Skykomish. Supplies ten miles west at Skykomish.

DENNY CREEK

Off U.S. 10, elevation 2,200 feet, ten campsites, adequate toilets and fireplaces. On Old Sunset Highway twenty miles east of North Bend, three miles

off new highway. Supplies at Summit Inn, three and five-tenths of a mile distance. Fishing at nearby lakes, camping, picnicking.

DOG LAKE

On State Highway No. 5, elevation 3,900 feet, seven campsites, stream water, and adequate toilet facilities. On Dog Lake 1.5 miles east of Summit. Supplies Silver Beach five miles east or Packwood seventeen miles west. Boating, fishing, hunting. Boats for lease.

LIZARD LAKE (ALSO KNOWN AS MONAD LAKE)

Off U.S. 10, elevation 3,600 feet, twelve campsites, spring water, fifteen fireplaces, and adequate toilet facilities. On Green River forest road fourteen miles west of Easton. Shelter, supplies Easton, hunting, fishing, huckleberries.

MONEY CREEK

On U.S. 2, elevation 860, twenty-one campsites, stream water, twenty fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. On Stevens Pass Highway four miles west of Skykomish. Supplies at Skykomish four miles. Fishing, picnicking, and bathing.

SAWMILL FLAT

On U.S. 410, elevation 2,500 feet, twenty-five campsites, twelve fireplaces, stream water, adequate toilet facilities. On Naches Highway forty-two miles northwest of Yakima. Community kitchen. Supplies American River Resort six miles. Hunting, fishing and picnicking.

SILVER SPRINGS

On U.S. 410, elevation 2,700, twenty-nine campsites, twenty-nine fireplaces, stream and spring water, adequate toilet facilities. On Naches Highway thirty-two miles east of Enumclaw. Supplies at Enumclaw. Fishing, camping and berry picking.

TAYLOR RIVER

Off U.S. 10, elevation 1,000 feet, ten campsites, fourteen fireplaces, stream water, adequate toilet facilities. On middle Fork Snoqualmie River twenty miles northeast of North Bend. Mountain forest road, graveled. Fishing and trail hiking to lakes. Supplies North Bend, twenty miles distance.

TROUBLESOME CREEK

Off U.S. 2, elevation 1,300 feet, twenty campsites, twenty-three fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. On north fork of Skykomish road twelve miles northeast from Stevens Pass Highway near Index. Supplies at Index. Fishing.

TWIN CAMPS

Off U.S. 410, elevation 4,125, four campsites, spring water, adequate toilet facilities. On Twin Camps road ten miles off Naches Highway. Four fire holes, supplies at Enumclaw a distance of thirty-three miles. Huckleberries.

WEST FORK MILLER RIVER

Off U.S. 2, elevation 1200 feet, four campsites, stream water, four fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. On Miller River Road on route to Lake Dorothy eight miles south of Skykomish. Supplies at Skykomish. Camping

and fishing. SNOQUALMIE NATIONAL FOREST CAMPS (Cont.)

WHITE PASS

On State Highway No. 5, elevation 4,480 feet, fourteen campsites, twenty-six fireplaces, stream water and adequate toilet facilities. Approach road from White Pass Highway just east of White Pass. Supplies at Silver Beach seven miles east or Coal Creek fifteen miles west. Cafe and chairlift runs weekends. Cascade Crest Trail travel, on Leech Lake one eighth mile from highway.

CAMPS FOUND IN MOUNT BAKER NATIONAL FOREST

BACON CREEK

On State Highway 17-A, blacktopped, five miles north of Marblemount, elevation 400, four campsites, 2 kyboes, parking area for six cars, stream water, and four fireplaces, supplies at Marblemount.

BAKER LAKE

On Federal Highway 25, elevation 670, 20 campsites, 10 fireplaces, lake and stream water, 8 kyboes. On Baker River Road 22 miles north of Concrete, with fair road from Concrete to Baker Lake. Supplies at Concrete. Fishing and hiking.

BEDAL LAKE

Elevation 1200, 5 campsites, 6 fireplaces, stream water and 4 kyboes. On Sauk Road 18.5 miles southeast of Darrington on a forest road. 2 shelters. This is a Way Camp on the Mountain Loop Road. Supplies at Darrington.

BOULDER CREEK

On Federal Highway 25, elevation 1,150, 10 campsites, stream water, 2 kyboes. On Baker River Road 17 miles north of Concrete.

BRIDGE

On State Highway 1, elevation 1150, seven fireplaces, stream water, 2 kyboes. On Mount Baker Highway, 6 miles east of Glacier with good highway. Supplies at Glacier. Fishing.

BUCK CREEK

Elevation 1,020, 19 campsites, 19 fireplaces, stream water, 6 kyboes. On Suiattle Road 24 miles east of Darrington on a good forest road. Supplies at Darrington. Fishing.

CLEAR CREEK

Elevation 600, seventeen campsites, twenty fireplaces, pipe water, four kyboes. On Clear Creek Spur Road 3 miles from Arlington-Darrington Highway, 3 miles southeast of Darrington with graveled road. Supplies at Darrington. Fishing.

COAL CREEK

On Federal Highway 7, elevation 1615, four campsites, two fireplaces, stream water, two kyboes. On South Fork Stillaguamish Highway, 24.5 miles east of Granite Falls on paved road. Supplies at Silverton, 1.5 miles east. Fishing.

MT. BAKER NATIONAL FOREST CAMPS (Cont.)

DOUGLAS FIR

On State Highway 1, elevation 975, thirty campsites, thirty fireplaces. Piped water, six kyboes. On Mount Baker Highway, two miles east of Glacier. Paved and oiled road. Supplies at Glacier. Fishing.

DOWNEY CREEK

Elevation 1420, ten campsites, ten fireplaces, stream water, four kyboes. On Suiattle road, 3 miles east of Darrington on a good forest road. Supplies at Darrington. Fishing.

FRENCH CREEK

Elevation 500 feet, nine campsites, twelve fireplaces, stream water, four toilets. On French Spur Road one mile from Arlington-Darrington Highway. Nine miles west of Darrington. One shelter, community kitchen. Supplies Darrington. Whitehorse three miles southeast. Hunting, hiking, and picnicking.

GALENA

On State Highway No. 1, elevation 3,975 feet, twenty campsites, sixteen fireplaces, stream water, and adequate toilet facilities. On Mt. Baker Highway, twenty-two miles east of Glacier on State Highway. Mt. Baker Lodge one mile. Fishing nearby stocked lakes.

GOLD BASIN

On south fork of Stillaguamish section of the Mountain Loop Highway. Fourteen miles east of Granite Falls on paved road. Community kitchen. Limited supply of groceries at Verlot, two miles. Fishing, hiking and hunting. Elevation 1,100 feet, eighteen campsites, piped water, twelve fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities.

GOODELL CREEK

On State Highway No. 17, parking space for ten cars, ten campsites, eight fireplaces, stream water, four toilets. On State Highway 17-A, blacktopped, fifteen miles north of Marblemount. Supplies at Newhalem. Stores closed on Saturday and Sunday. Hiking and fishing. Trips by boat and bus to Diablo and Ross Lakes.

TEMPLE CREEK

On south fork of Stillaguamish section of the Mountain Loop Highway, thirteen and six-tenths of a mile from Granite Falls on paved road. Fishing, hunting and hiking. Elevation 1,100 feet, four campsites, stream water, four fireplaces, two toilets.

MARBLE CREEK

On Cascade River road, a gravel country road. Nine miles east of Marblemount. Supplies Marblemount. Fishing, hiking, mountain climbing. Elevation 978 feet, eighteen campsites, six fireplaces, stream water, and adequate toilet facilities.

MONTE CRISTO LAKE

On south fork Sauk Section of the Mountain Loop Highway. Thirty-four and five-tenths of a mile east of Granite Falls or twenty-four miles southeast of Darrington. One shelter, Lake and stream fishing. Elevation 1,800 feet,

MT. BAKER NATIONAL FOREST CAMPS (Cont.)
three campsites and toilet facilities.

MONTE CRISTO

On Monte Cristo spur of Mountain Loop Highway, thirty-six miles east of Granite Falls. Twenty-five miles paved road, 11 miles poor one-lane road. Fishing, hiking, exploration of ghost mining town of Monte Cristo. Elevation 2,800 feet, two campsites, six fireplaces, river water.

MOWTICH

Elevation 2,150, campsites two, four fireplaces, river water, and one kybo. On South Fork Auk Section of Mountain Loop Highway. Thirty-two and five-tenths of a mile east of Granite Falls. Twenty-five miles of paved road, seven and five-tenths of a mile of poor one-lane road. One shelter. Fishing and hiking.

NINE MILE

On State Highway No. 1, elevation 1,825, six campsites, stream water, six fireplaces, two kyboes. On Mt. Baker Highway, nine miles east of Glacier with good highway. Fishing and camping.

NOOKSACK

On State Highway No. 1, elevation 1,225 feet, ten campsites, piped water, ten fireplaces, and four toilets. On Mt. Baker Highway, five miles east of Glacier with good highway. Supplies at Glacier.

RED BRIDGE

Elevation 1,275 feet, sixteen campsites, river water, fourteen fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. On South Fork Stillaguamish Section of the Mountain Loop Highway, eighteen and five-tenths of a mile east of Granite Falls. Paved road, fishing, hunting, hiking.

SILVER FIR

On State Highway No. 1, elevation 1,990, fourteen campsites, piped water, sixteen fireplaces, four toilets. On Mt. Baker Highway, fourteen miles east of Glacier on State Highway. Community kitchen.

SLOAN CREEK

Elevation 1,800 feet, three campsites, stream water, three fireplaces, two toilets. On North Fork of Sauk River, eight miles off Loop Highway. One shelter. Stream fishing, hunting, hiking. Shortest route to Glacier Peak.

SULPHUR CREEK

Elevation 1,560 feet, fifteen campsites, stream water, fifteen fireplaces, and adequate toilet facilities. On Suiattle Road, thirty-two miles east of Darrington on a good forest road. Supplies Darrington. Fishing and hiking.

SUNNYSIDE

Elevation 1,250 feet, fifteen campsites, river water, fifteen fireplaces, four toilets. On South Fork of Stillaguamish Section of the Mountain Loop Highway, eighteen miles east of Granite Falls. Paved road. Fishing and hiking.

VERLOT

Elevation 960 feet, thirty campsites, piped water, thirty fireplaces, and

adequate toilet facilities. On South Ford of Stillaguamish Section of the Mountain Loop Highway, twelve miles east of Granite Falls. Paved road. Limited supply of groceries at Verlot adjacent to campground. Fishing and hiking.

WHITE CHUCK

Elevation 800 feet, six campsites, stream water, six fireplaces, and two toilets. On Sauk Road eleven miles southeast of Darrington on a forest road. Supplies Darrington.

CAMPS FOUND IN GIFFORD PINCHOT NATIONAL FOREST

CHAMBERS LAKE

Off State Highway No. 5, elevation 4,500 feet, four campsites and four picnic units. Two toilets and spring water. On Chambers Lake, forest road 1115, forty miles east of Randle. Depot for travelers to Goat Rocks Wild Area. Supplies at Randle and Packwood. Also route by way of Packwood nineteen miles south on Johnson Creek Road.

COAL CREEK

On White Pass Highway No. 5, four miles northeast of Packwood. Elevation 1200, eight campsites, two toilets, stream water. Supplies can be obtained at Packwood.

KILLEN CREEK

Off U.S. 830, elevation 4,451, six campsites, two toilets, six fireplaces, and stream water. On Midway Loop Road 101, forty-one miles southeast of Randle; fifty-one miles northeast of Trout Lake. Supplies at Randle or Trout Lake.

LA WIS WIS

On White Pass Highway No. 5, seven miles northeast of Packwood. Elevation 1200 feet, ten campsites, two toilets, ten fireplaces, and piped water. Supplies available at Packwood.

SODA SPRINGS

Off State Highway No. 5, elevation 2,700, ten campsites, piped water, three fireplaces and four Kyboes. At end of Summit Creek Road, fourteen miles from Packwood. Supplies available at Packwood.

MAIN S. SHORE

On State Highway 1-R, elevation 3,200, a hundred and ten campsites, a hundred fireplaces, thirteen kyboes, and piped water. On Spirit Lake Highway 1-R. Boat dock and landing. Community kitchen. Supplies at Spirit Lake Lodge one mile. Opportunities for fishing, swimming and camping.

CEDAR LAKE

On State Highway No. 1-R, elevation 3,200 feet, five campsites, one toilet, five fireplaces, and stream water. On east shore of Spirit Lake, two miles from end of road.

DONNYBROOK

On State Highway No. 1-R, elevation 3,200 feet, two toilets, six campsites

and stream water. On east shore of Spirit Lake, one and one half miles from end of road. Supplies at Spirit Lake Lodge.

TAKHLAKH LAKE

Off U. S. 830 and State Highway No. 5, elevation 4,300 feet, eighteen campsites. Lake water, eighteen fireplaces and four kyboes. On Midway Loop Road 101, thirty-one miles southeast of Randle. Supplies at Trout Lake or Randle.

WALUPT LAKE

Off State Highway No. 5, elevation 4,000 feet, seventeen campsites, four toilets, stream water, and twelve tables. On Walupt Lake Road 1114, three miles off Cispus Road 123, forty miles from Randle. Supplies at Randle and Packwood. May also be reached from Packwood on Johnson Creek Road a distance of twenty-four miles.

CAMPS FOUND IN OLYMPIC NATIONAL FOREST

BEAR GULCH

Off U.S. 101, elevation 750 feet, two campsites, stream water, three fireplaces and two toilets. On Lake Cushman Forest Road fifteen miles west of Hoodspport. Supplies Hoodspport and private resort one mile. Fishing both lake and stream.

BIG QUIL RIVER

Off U.S. 101, elevation 1,700 feet, piped water, four fireplaces, and two toilets. On Townsend Creek Road, seven miles west of highway. Supplies Quilcene nine miles.

COLLINS

Off U.S. 101, elevation 278 feet, six campsites, stream water, four fireplaces, two toilets. On Duckabush River Forest Road five miles west off the Olympic Highway. Supplies at Brinnon five miles. Fishing in Duckabush River, hiking.

DUNGENESS

Off U.S. 101, elevation 800 feet, nine campsites, nine fireplaces, four toilets. On Louella Road thirteen miles south of Sequim. Hunting, fishing in Dungeness and Greywoldf Rivers, hiking.

ELKHORN

Off U.S. 101, elevation 650, fifteen campsites, piped water, fifteen fireplaces, four toilets. On Dosewallips River, eleven miles from Olympic Highway. Supplies Brinnon eleven miles. Hunting, fishing in Doewallips River and hiking.

HAMMA HAMMA

Off U.S. 101, elevation 600 feet, four campsites, stream water, three fireplaces, two toilets. On Hamma Hamma Forest Road, six miles west off the Olympic Highway. Supplies Eldon seven miles. Fishing both lake and stream.

KLAHOWYA

U.S. Highway 101, elevation 750 feet, twenty campsites, piped water, twenty

fireplaces, and adequate toilet facilities. On Soleduck River. Fishing in stream. Near site of Old Soleduck Burn. Twenty miles east of Forks. Supplies at Forks.

LENA CREEK

Off U.S. 101, elevation 500 feet, two campsites, well water, two fireplaces, two toilets. On Hamma Hamma Forest Road. Eight miles west off Olympic Highway. Supplies nine miles at Eldon. At base of trail to Lena Lake.

NORTH MT. WALKER

Off U.S. 101, elevation 3,018 feet, one fireplace. On Forest Road five miles from Olympic Highway. Supplies at Quilcene ten miles. Exceptional view of Puget Sound, Cascade Mountains and Olympic Mountains. Lookout at Summit.

SOUTH MT. WALKER

Off U.S. 101, elevation 3,018 feet, on Forest Road five miles from Olympic Highway. Supplies at Quilcene ten miles. Lookout at Summit, excellent views of Cascade and Olympic Mountains.

RAINBOW

On U.S. 101, elevation 727, eight campsites, piped water, eight fireplaces, four toilets. On Olympic Highway, five miles south of Quilcene. Community kitchen. Supplies at Quilcene. Mt. Walker scenic drive 1000 feet. Fishing and hiking.

CAMPS FOUND IN WENATCHEE NATIONAL FOREST

BEVERLY

Off U.S. 97, elevation 3,400 feet, five campsites, two toilets, five fireplaces, creek water. On North Fork Teanaway River Forest Road off Sunset Highway U.S. 97, nine miles east of Cle Elum, then twenty-two miles north. Seven camps. Supplies at Cle Elum. Base trips to Mr. Stuart.

BOX CANYON

Off U.S. 10, elevation 2,250 feet, twenty-seven campsites, lake water, thirty fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. On Lake Kachess six miles off U.S. 10 and twenty-seven miles northwest of Cle Elum. Boat launching, hunting, fishing.

BRIDGE CREEK

Off U.S. 97, elevation 2,175 feet, six campsites, stream water, seven fireplaces, three toilets. Upper Stehekin River fifty-three miles northwest of Chelan City by boat or plane. Sixteen miles by fair road from Stehekin. One trail, shelter. Supplies at Chelan or Stehekin. Fishing and hiking.

BRIDGE CREEK

U.S. 2, elevation 1600 feet, seven campsites, stream water, eight fireplaces, four toilets. On Icicle River Forest Road ten miles west of Leavenworth. Hunting, fishing and mountain climbing.

BUCK MEADOWS

Off State Highway No. 3M. Elevation 4,800 feet, eight campsites, creek

WENATCHEE NATIONAL FOREST CAMPS (Cont.)

water, four fireplaces, two toilets. On Taneum Road twenty-three miles west of Ellensburg, dirt road. Supplies Ellensburg, hunting and fishing. Base for pack trips to Lost Lake and Manastash Lake.

CHIWAUKUM CREEK

U.S. 2, elevation 1,850, seven campsites, stream water, three fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. Side road off U.S. 2 above Chiwaukum Creek, hunting and fishing. Supplies at Leavenworth.

ROCKY RUN

U.S. 10, elevation 2,530 feet, eighteen campsites, piped water, fourteen fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. On Chiwawa Road thirty-one miles north of Leavenworth. Supplies Crescent Beach.

SALMON LA SAC

Off U.S. 10, elevation 2,395, thirty six campsites, piped water, thirty-six fireplaces, adequate toilet facilities. On Cle Elum River Forest Road twenty-one miles north of Cle Elum. Community kitchen. Baseball, swing, rustic benches. Fishing, hiking, scenery, hunting. Supplies Hoyt's one-fourth mile.

SODA SPRINGS

Off State Highway No. 15C, elevation 2,000 feet, six campsites, stream water, two toilets, five picnic units. On Little Wenatchee Forest Road via Lake Wenatchee sixty miles northwest of Wenatchee. Supplies Crescent Beach a distance of ten miles.

WHITE RIVER FALLS

Off State Highway No. 15D, elevation 2,200 feet, six campsites, stream water, two fireplaces, two toilets. On White River Forest Road thirty miles north of Leavenworth. Hunting and fishing. Base camp for back country and Cascade Crest Trail. Supplies at Crescent Beach at a distance of thirteen miles.

KACHESS

Off U.S. Highway 10, elevation 2250, twenty-seven campsites, twenty-two fireplaces, piped water, eight kyboes. On Lake Kachess Forest Road to Kachess Lake 5 miles off Sunset Highway. 26 miles northwest of Cle Elum. Supplies 5 miles. Fishing, hunting.

LAKE CREEK

Elevation 2400, ten campsites, eight fireplaces, stream water, two kyboes. On Little Wenatchee Forest Road via Lake Wenatchee sixty-three miles northwest of Wenatchee. Thirteen miles forest road base camp for trips to Cascade Crest Trail and back country. Hunting, fishing. Supplies Crescent Beach at Lake Wenatchee.

LAKE CREEK CAMP

Off U.S. 97, elevation 2100, three campsites, three fireplaces, creek water. On Entiat River Road, twenty-nine miles northwest of Entiat. Supplies at Entiat. Fishing, hunting.

LAKE WENATCHEE

Off State Highway 15, elevation 2000, ten campsites, six fireplaces, spring

and stream, two kyboes. At Ranger Station on Lake Wenatchee Road (north side) 50 miles northwest of Wenatchee. Supplies at Crescent Beach, one mile. Hunting, fishing, boating.

LITTLE WENATCHEE FORD

Off State Highway 15D, elevation 2500, six campsites, stream water, two kyboes. End of Little Wenatchee Road. Hunting, fishing boating. Supplies at Crescent Beach.

SECTION 4 MOUNTAIN HIKING CAMPS

For the camping unit that wants that added thrill of adventure by exploring the great mountains wonders of our Cascade Mountains, we present Section 4 to help satisfy this desire. In a sense the off the beaten track camping troop lives and enjoys the greatest of Scouting experiences.

In this section you will find references to several different types of maps which in the eyes of the experienced mountain traveller are a must for satisfactory mountain travel.

The following maps definitions should add clarity to the various descriptions which follow: A U.S.G.S. Quad Sheet, is a topographic map which shows the land contours, water courses, monuments, and etc., and was prepared by the United States Geological Survey. These maps are available from several local sources.

County Maps - a land plat which shows road, towns, water courses and monuments of a local county area. These can be procured from several sources locally.

Recreational Area Map - an outline map prepared by the U.S. Forest Service and which is usually available free of charge at District Forest Ranger Offices.

ANGELINE LAKE, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District. Recommended rank for Scouts Second Class and above, suitable for up to 20 Scouts and Leaders. One and one-fourth mile by one-half mile, lake at elevation of 5,100 feet. Three miles south of Copper Lake, the trail passing foot of Big Heart Lake route. Extremely rocky and precipitious cliffs around most of the shore, but very beautiful country. Camping: Shelters at Cooper and Big Heart Lakes.

ANNETTE LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle, Snoqualmie Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District, suitable for up to 50 Scouts and Leaders. Recommended rank for Scouts Tenderfoot or above. One-eighth mile in diameter, elevation 3,000. Take Snoqualmie Pass Highway to eighteen miles east of North Bend. The trail starts just opposite Asahel Curtis Camp Grounds on the highway where it follows three and one-half miles south up Humpback Creek to lake shore. Good campsites. No permanent shelters.

GREEN WATER RIVER, KING COUNTY

70 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, White River Ranger District. Suitable for thirty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended rank for Scouts, Tenderfoot and above. A fair sized tributary of the White River. The mouth of the river lies nineteen miles east of Enumclaw on the Naches Pass Highway.

MOUNTAIN HIKING CAMPS (Cont.)

A forest service road leaves the highway at guard station about five miles above green water, cuts back to river about three miles, follows up river to Himes Camp Ground. Seven miles from Naches Pass Highway on Twin Camps road. Trail continues up Green Water from road past two Green Water lakes, Meeker Lake and up five miles to Echo Lake the source. Camping places along the stream.

HANCOCK LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to thirty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout qualification, candidate or above. One by one-half mile, elevation 2,200 feet. From Snoqualmie take road up to North Fork of the Snoqualmie River, keeping right on road to cable bridge. Leave car cross bridge and follow Lake Callagan Trail to Black Creek, the first creek encountered. Trail follows up creek to lake shore, a total distance of about three and one-half miles from the North Fork. Once a beautiful mountain lake, surrounded by a dense stand of timber. The lake is now being devastated by logging.

BIG HEART LAKE, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District. Suitable for up to thirty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout qualification, second class or above. One and one-fourth miles by one-half, elevation 5,000 feet. One of the groups of lakes lying at the headwaters of the Foss River and accessible from Skykomish on the Stevens Pass Highway via Trout Lake and Copper Lake. Trail leaves southside of Copper Lake, passing Little Heart Lake, a distance of two and one-half miles from Copper Lake.

LITTLE HEART LAKE, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District. Suitable for up to fifteen Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout qualifications, Second Class. One-fourth by one-eighth mile, elevation 4,600. The lake lies in an open stand of timber with a rocky shore line. A beautiful lake, surrounded by rocky cliffs in scenic country, with good fishing. A trail continues past Big Heart Lake to Angeline Lake. Twelve hundred feet below Delta Lake can be seen from the trail at the foot of Big Heart Lake. No trail connects the two, the best way to reach Delta Lake, being to follow the trail back one-fourth mile to a small meadow, then down over rock slides and through woods to lake shore. Shore line bushy except on upper end where inlets from Big Heart, Otter and Angeline Lake enter outlet of Delta Lake to follow down to Trout Lake, a bushwacking trip without trail, a real rugged adventure for Scouts.

KALEETAN LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to twenty Scouts and Leaders, recommended rank for Scouts second class or above. One-fourth by one-half mile, elevation 3,600 feet. Take Pratt Lake Trail to Tuscohatchie Lake where Mountain Cabin Memorial Assoc. shelter sleeping ten is available, then follow left fork of Kallettan Lake Trail from near outlet of Tuscohatchie Lake three and one-half miles to lake. Part of trail route is shown on the Cedar Lake U.S.G.S. Chart as well as on the Snoqualmie Quadrangle.

KULLAKULLA LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Cedar Lake Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for fifteen Scouts and Leaders. Recommended for Explorers or Senior Scouts. One-eighth by one-half mile, elevation 3,400 feet. A high mountain lake surrounded by dense timber. Lake shore partly open and

partly brushy. Turn off Snoqualmie Pass Highway at Concrete Bridge four and one-half miles west of the Summit. Pratt Lake Trail leaves at this point, climbing the side of Granite Mountain to Ollallie Lake at top of divide. Take Mt. Defiance trail three miles to small pond called Mirror Lake a total of seven miles from the highway, then one-half mile northeast without trail but easy going to Kullakulla Lake, beginning of Pratt Lake Trail shown on Snoqualmie Quadrangle.

SUNDAY LAKE, KING COUNTY

60 miles from Seattle. Sultan Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District, suitable for up to thirty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended for Second Class Scouts & above. One-half by one-eighth mile, elevation 2,000 feet. From Snoqualmie take the North Fork Road to end, then three miles on North Fork Trail to Sunday Creek, then one and one-half miles on same trail then three miles to lake, a total distance of seven and one-half miles. Sunday Lake is a chain of connected ponds, mostly shallow and subject to high water until mid fishing season.

SNOQUALMIE LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Sultan Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to forty Senior Scouts or Explorers and Leaders. One and one-fourth by one-half miles, elevation 3,225 feet. From Stevens Pass Highway two miles west of Skykomish take Miller River Road for four miles to forks, then trail to left up the main river seven and one-half miles to Lake Dorothy, continue two and one-half miles past Bear Lake and Deer Lake to Snoqualmie Lake. Also accessible by road up the middle fork of the Snoqualmie to Taylor River and up Taylor River by trail eight miles. Only three miles by trail from logging road to lake, but usually necessary to hike from eight mile point. Forest Service shelter and good camping places.

TUSCOHATCHIE LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to thirty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout rank second class or above. One-half by one-fourth miles, elevation 3,500 feet. A high mountain lake lying one-half miles east of Pratt Lake at the head of Pratt River. Also accessible by trail up Denny Creek from Snoqualmie Pass Highway just two miles west of the Summit. Continue through Hemlock Pass four and one-half miles to Melakwa Lakes, then south two and one-half miles along trail to lake shore. Outlet partly open and partly bushy shore.

UPPER TUSCOHATCHIE LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to twenty Scouts and Leaders, recommended Scout Rank, second class. Take Pratt Lake Trail one mile from the Snoqualmie Pass Highway, turning off to follow Granite Mountain Lookout Trail three miles to saddle where lake can be seen.

WILDCAT LAKE, KING COUNTY

60 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to fifteen Senior Scouts and Explorers. One-eighth mile in diameter, elevation, 3,800 feet. Accessible by road up the middle fork of Snoqualmie past Dingford Creek to Wildcat Creek, then by trail up through timber two miles, where trail disappears turn left at dry creek bed. Then up rock slide one mile to small pond at top, then over ridge to lake.

UPPER WILDCAT LAKE, KING COUNTY

60 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District.

MOUNTAIN HIKING CAMPS (Cont.)

Suitable for up to fifteen Senior Scouts, Explorers and Leaders. Follow ridge to right to Upper Wildcat Lake, best route via Snow Lake Trail, then on toward Gem Lake and over saddle Northwest of Gem Lake, then down approximately 1 mile to Upper Wildcat Lake. Distance is somewhat greater, but Wildcat Trail is no longer maintained. Another lake is one-half mile up inlet of Wildcat Lake.

LEPUL LAKE, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District. Suitable for twenty Explorers, Senior Scouts and Leaders. One-fourth by one-eighth miles. Take east Fork Foss River Trail for about two and one-half miles. Then right up fork of stream one and one-half miles, following trail. Lake lies on high ridge east of Necklace Valley Lakes.

MELAKWA LAKES, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to sixty Scouts and Leaders, recommended rank, second class or above. They are very small, clear scenic lakes lying at the foot of a long Alpine Valley, leading south from a saddle between Kaleetan and Chair Peaks. Snow Lake lies north of the saddle. The lakes are reached by following Denny Creek Trail from Denny Creek Camp on Snoqualmie Pass Highway to lakes, a distance of four and one-half miles.

MARMOT LAKE, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District. Suitable for up to twenty Explorers, Senior Scouts and Leaders. The lake lies at the head of the main prong of Deception Creek. Accessible by trail up Deception Creek nine miles of trail. Also reached by taking Pacific Crest Trail to Deception Pass at head of Deception Creek.

NORDRUM LAKE, KING COUNTY

50 miles from Seattle. Sultan Quadrangle, North Bend Ranger District. Suitable for up to forty Explorers, Senior Scouts and Leaders. One-half by one-fourth miles, elevation 4,300 feet. Take road up the middle fork of the Snoqualmie River to Taylor River, road up Taylor River six and one-half miles then trail one-half mile to forks where trail branches off to the South three miles to Nordrum Lake. Good camping places at Nordrum Lake.

SURPRISE CREEK, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District. Suitable for up to forty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout rank, second class. Take Stevens Pass Highway to scenic campground, two-hundred yards west of Scenic depot. Trail follows southside of Great Northern Railroad for one-third mile, starting at entrance to campground where it crosses creek near mouth. Continue on trail two and one-half miles past Surprise Lake and Glacier Lake over Surprise Divide, to Twin Lakes. A chain of three connecting lakes.

SURPRISE LAKE, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District. Suitable for up to forty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended minimum Scout rank for trip second class. One-half by one-fourth mile, elevation 4,600. Four and one-half miles up Surprise Creek from scenic trail skirting east side of lake. Camping places near by. Glacier Lake is one mile beyond.

LOOP TRIP, KING COUNTY

80 miles from Seattle. Skykomish Quadrangle, Skykomish Ranger District.

MOUNTAIN HIKING CAMPS (Cont.)

Suitable for up to forty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended rank for Scouts, second class. Surprise Creek Deception Creek Loop Trip, a delightful mountain loop trip which can be made in three days camping at Glacier Lake the first night and then moving camp to Twin Lakes using last day to come out to Stevens Pass Highway via Deception Creek.

CLE ELUM LAKE, KITTITAS COUNTY

120 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, Cle Elum Ranger District. Suitable for up to fifty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended for Tenderfoot Scouts and above. One mile by nine miles when lake is full. Road leaving Sunset Highway at Cle Elum runs north through Roslyn and Ronald follow along east shore of lake. Continue up Cle Elum River. Cle Elum Lake is an irrigation reservoir. Good campgrounds available.

COOPER LAKE, KITTITAS COUNTY

120 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, Cle Elum Ranger District. Suitable for up to fifty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout rank qualification, tenderfoot and above. One and one-half by one and one-fourth miles, elevation 2,800 feet. Four miles up Cooper River from Cle Elum River at Salmon-la Sac. Situated in timbered country. Lake partly opened and partly bushy.

DEEP LAKE, KITTITAS COUNTY

120 miles from Seattle. Mt. Stuart Quadrangle, Salmon la Sac Ranger District, suitable for up to forty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout rank second class and above. One-half by one-fourth miles, elevation 4,500 feet. Take the road up Cle Elum River two and one-half miles past Fish Lake. Trail crosses river, climbs high ridge, over good graded trail and descends to outlet of Deep Lake. Total distance to lake is five miles. Deep Lake is exceptionally beautiful, clear water, mostly open shores surrounded by rugged peaks.

FISH LAKE, KITTITAS COUNTY (TUC QUA LA LAKE)

120 miles from Seattle. Mt. Stuart Quadrangle, Salmon La Sac Ranger Station. Suitable for up to sixty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended maximum rank for Scouts, Tenderfoot and above. Forty acres, elevation 3,000 feet. A wide spot on the Cle Elum River, twelve miles by road above Salmon La Sac. Surrounded by large meadows and clumps of alpine fir.

GOLD CREEK, KITTITAS COUNTY

60 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, Cle Elum Ranger District. Suitable for up to twenty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout rank second class and above. Crossed at mouth by Sunset Highway at Hyak. One mile west of Keechelus. Gold Creek trail starts approximately one mile from Sunset Highway at end of logging road on east side of Gold Creek.

KEECHELUS LAKE, KITTITAS COUNTY

60 miles from Seattle, Snoqualmie Quadrangle, Cle Elum Ranger District. Suitable for up to fifty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended Scout rank Tenderfoot and above. Six by one mile, elevation 2,454 feet. Paralleled by Sunset Highway just east of Summit. Improved forest camp at Rocky Run.

LILLIAN LAKE, KITTITAS COUNTY

60 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, Cle Elum Ranger District. Suitable for up to thirty Scouts and Leaders, second class Scouts and above

MOUNTAIN HIKING CAMPS (Cont.)

recommended Scout qualification. One-fourth mile in diameter, elevation 4,400 feet. Take trail from Rocky Run Forest Camp approximately two and one-half mile to Lake. Stocked with trout. Camp fires permits obtainable at Rocky Run.

LOST LAKE, KITTITAS COUNTY

70 miles from Seattle. Snoqualmie Quadrangle, Cle Elum Ranger District. Suitable for up to forty Scouts and Leaders. Recommended rank for Scouts, Second Class and above. One by one-half mile, elevation 2,800 feet. One and a half mile by trail up Roaring Creek from West side of Lake Keechelus. Accessible either by boat across the lake or by logging road around the foot from highway.

SECTION V HELPFUL HINTS TO HAPPY CAMPING

In this section of our Guide we have included some hints which might be of use for your particular unit. These hints are included in this guide in hopes that they may help you in having a happy camping experience.

What to do when lost in the woods:

A clear head will find itself. If everyone remembered this, there would be fewer reports of persons lost in the mountains and forests, according to the United States Forest Service Rangers.

Merely being out of sight of others in a strange Forest gives many a man the creeps -- a natural feeling but a dangerous one. Never yield to it. In the mountains the grip of panic is often the grip of death.

The following rules are worth remembering:

1. Stop, sit down and try to figure out where you are. Use your head not your legs.
2. If caught by night, fog, or storm, stop at once and make camp in a sheltered spot. Build a fire in a safe place. Gather plenty of dry fuel.
3. Don't wander about.
4. If injured choose a clear spot on a mountain spur and make a signal smoke.
5. Don't yell, don't worry, and above all DON'T QUIT.

Additional hints.

Always check with the forest ranger when visiting in forest areas. Know your international emergency signal. Three blasts (shots, smoke signals, flashes of light, etc.) executed on a periodic and regular timed interval. On long hikes the weight of the pack should not exceed 1/4 of the dress weight of the Scout or adult. For example if Scout weighed 120 pounds then maximum weight of the pack should not exceed 30 pounds.

10 Essentials for Mountain Travels

The following list of 10 items, which all experienced mountain travelers equip themselves with, represent minimum requirements for a safe mountain experience.

Climbing Code of All Mountaineering Scouts and Explorers.

1. A Climbing party of three is minimum.
2. Carry at all times the clothing food and equipment necessary.
3. Rope up in all exposed places.
4. Keep the party together obey the leader.
5. Never climb beyond ability and knowledge.
6. Judgement will not be swayed by desire.
7. Leave the trip schedule with a reliable person.
8. Follow the precepts of sound mountaineering.
9. Deport yourself in a Scout like manner at all times.
